


Lexi- I enjoyed Italian because we had to learn a new language. We got to go in the gym and try the police training which was something I have never experienced before.

Skills Academy Literacy Building Club




The English department have invited students in year 7 and 8 to join an after school club full of reading, dance, and football where we build up confidence in reading and feel inspired to learn through physical activity. Students are joined by year 12 students (members of the Beauchamps Football Academy and Performing Arts students) who read together. We are exploring two texts "They Don't Teach This" by Eniola Aluko and "No Ballet Shoes in Syria" by Catherine Bruton. Aluko is a professional footballer who played for the England woman's squad. She is of Nigerian and English heritage and her biography explores growing up on the streets in Birmingham and venturing into a 'man's' world. Bruton's fiction novel follows 11-year-old girl called Aya, her baby brother and Mum seeking asylum from the war in Syria. The book explains the struggles faced by modern day refugees seeking asylum in the U.K. through the eyes of a child. Both texts explore themes of diversity, identity, self-assurance, dedication, resilience and of course dance and football. 
