Jack Petchey Awards



Mr Harper was delighted to celebrate with the latest recipients of the prestigious Jack Petchey Awards. Jenna J Year 12, Archie S Year 8 and Sam W Year 7 were selected as winners by the Student Voice representatives from the 28 nominations of students that were put forward by students and staff. Below are the nominations followed by a few words from the students. Mr Beaumont

I would like to nominate our Sixth Former, Jenna for the Jack Petchey Award. Having previously taught Jenna and knowing her as a more able student, I have built a good relationship with her and this led to her opening

up to me this year about the ongoing challenges that she faces outside of her education. Living in a single-parent home, Jenna has revealed that her mother spends a considerable amount of time travelling for work. Jenna is mostly self-sufficient in the home and has had to take on a part time job in order to replenish food as her mum was forced to make key-financial decisions during the pandemic that has increased financial commitments



now, making their economic circumstances incredibly tight. As a result of seeing her parent struggle, Jenna shoulders this responsibility alongside her mother (who is proud and does not ask for anything) and implicitly contributes to her household by filling the fridge regularly with her own part-time income and pays her own travel costs to and from school in order to reduce the burden on her mum. Following her experiences, Jenna recognises that helping others can share workload and has actively sought out and volunteered in the English department to support struggling students, she frequently gives up her spare time to support us with displays and celebrating student work alongside continuously refining her studies towards opening up career opportunities for her. For me, Jenna stands out as a resilient, hard-working, compassionate student who deserves to be recognised for her inspirational and unwavering effort.

Jack Petchey Awards

Jenna writes...Throughout Year 12 I have had to balance my work, school, social and home life to make sure that I am not overwhelmed and to allow myself to put the important things first. By doing just this, I have been able to ensure a successful outcome in anything I put my mind to whether that be my increase in organisation for Sixth Form, to promotions at my workplace, as well as ensuring that my mum has to worry that little bit less when it comes to providing for me.

I was completely surprised when I got told that I had been nominated for the Jack Petchey award for my continuous contribution to my household while my mum is away with work. As a single mother, my mum has to go away to try and make sure she is providing the best for me in any way she can, mainly in working for hours on end. I always want to make sure that she doesn't have to worry and I try to help out in any way I possibly can, as I owe it to her. Working at my part time job has enabled me to provide myself with money for things including travel, folders for Sixth Form as well as key pieces of stationery all of which has helped me learn to the best of my ability. This has inevitably meant that I have been able to do effective revision and push to make my mum proud everyday.

As a 16 year old in the middle of her Sixth Form journey, it has been so important for me to learn how to prioritise what is important and ensure that my mum is never struggling. My mum is the strongest and most amazing person that I have ever experienced; she always wants the best for me and pushes me in school and work, to reach the best of my ability. My mum is my inspiration, therefore, I just want to thank her for everything that she has done. Mum, you have made me want to achieve the best and the best only; this is what I see you do everyday!

Throughout a difficult time of trying to get through the strain of finances, school and work, the English department have done everything to support me in any way they can. I have decided to give my grant to them as I would like students to be able to organise their learning and want the best for themselves, like I want for my mum. The English department have been an important accessory in the person that I am today, therefore they deserve to provide their students with items they deem as necessary so students are able to hit the goals they dream to achieve.

I would like to nominate Archie S in 8Z2En for the Jack Petchey Award. Archie has experienced a very disruptive year in his home life: dad has been battling cancer, Archie needed an operation on his writing hand in the autumn term and (most recently), he lost his grandfather. Archie also has diagnosed SEN and he came to me at the beginning of the year in tears to explain how it impacts his behaviour in lessons and that he found English as a subject particularly difficult throughout Year 7. Over the course of the year, despite what has been going on outside of school, Archie has managed to transform from a student with historic challenging behaviour to a role model for positive behaviour in my lessons. In addition, despite his operation, Archie completed ALL work remotely whilst he was off and brought it all in, taking care to stick it into his book in order. On returning to class, he conducted his use of a laptop in class well and ensured that he did not miss out on any opportunity to progress his learning. Furthermore, following the devastating loss of his



grandfather - whom Archie was very close to - Archie continues to maintain his outstanding effort in lessons, completing all and any extra homework. I have already sent positive emails home as his assessment data demonstrates that in the face of adversity he continues to progress; his attainment and his positive attitude has never wavered. Not only does he deserve to be nominated, but his resilience outshines his peers and he deserves to win.

Archie writes...I chose my grant money to go half and half to the History and English departments as they are my favourite subjects and because they have supported me through everything. I would like to thank everybody for nominating and supporting me.

I would like to nominate one of my students, Sam W for a Jack Petchey Award. Sam is one of the most incredible children I have ever met and I am in awe of his bravery and resilience. Sam is currently studying in Year 7 and joined us on roll in September 2022. At four months of age, it was thought Sam had Cerebral Palsy as he was not smiling or moving. He began to smile, roll and sit at eight months and walked when he was around two years old. He was referred for further assessments to a genetic consultant and received the diagnosis of Soto Syndrome in April 2014. Soto Syndrome is a genetic condition affecting physical growth accompanied by developmental delay, as well as physical, speech and language difficulties. Sam has severe Scoliosis because of his condition and must wear a back brace. When Sam was born, he was starved of oxygen for eleven minutes. He had grommets inserted in June 2014. He had open heart surgery for a hole in his heart in February 2015 and surgery to remove a cyst on his back. He has had pneumonia on two

occasions, resulting in a collapsed lung and hospitalisation from September to mid-November 2016. He has received input from the Paediatric Respiratory Genetics, Consultant Clinical Consultant Orthopaedic Spinal Surgeon and Community Paediatrician throughout his life. Sam has had 9 major surgeries so far and they are likely to be ongoing throughout his life due to his condition. Sam has ear problems and recently had his second surgery in one year on his inner ear which was a significant procedure. In short, this boy is absolutely incredible. He comes to school every day and I have never heard him complain, even when in pain! Sam was back to school shortly after his most recent ear surgery, when I asked him before the operation if he was nervous, he simply replied - 'no, it's fine'! For all Sam has to contend with in life, he never makes excuses for himself, he works

harder than any student I know, he is kind and caring and has a great moral compass and will call anyone out if they are being unkind or disrespectful. It is a rare trait to be so unapologetically you at such a young age, Sam accepts all his difficulties and uses them to inspire others, I don't think he even realises he does this, but believe me, people who are fortunate to work with Sam are humbled by his ability to get on with life and always have a smile on his face! I can think of no-one more worthy of a Jack Petchey Award!

Sam writes...As a 12 year old boy with Soto Syndrome receiving the Jack Petchey award means a lot to me. It's a recognition of my achievements and hard work which makes me feel proud and happy. The award also serves as a reminder that despite the challenges I face because of my condition, I can still accomplish great things. I hope the award inspires other students with any conditions or additional needs to believe in themselves, love the skin they are in and pursue their dreams.

Trip to New York 1

Monday evening's activities included a quick stop for dinner and then a visit to the Empire State Building Observation Deck for our first glimpse of the Big Apple.

Our first full day began with a tour of the UN buildings situated on the banks of the river Hudson. Students were given guided tours where the staff explained the important role of the UN in maintaining international peace and also working towards nuclear disarmament and worldwide human rights.



We then walked to Midtown where students were given some free time to grab lunch and engage in some retail therapy – which many took very seriously!

After returning to the hotel to drop off our bags, it was then back out for dinner at the Hard Rock Café, followed by an evening performance of the Lion King on Broadway which was enjoyed by all. Those sitting on the aisle were certainly surprised by the interactive parts of the show!

Wednesday was our first chance to experience the New York subway on our trip downtown to the World Trade Centre and 9/11 museum. For the staff it was odd to think that none of the students were alive when the 9/11 attacks happened, but the students certainly appreciated the sombre nature of the memorial and were very interested to see the stories told within the museum itself.

As part of our visit, we ascended to the top of the new One World Trade Tower with extensive views of the city – not for those who don't like heights!!



After a quick detour to Wall Street (for Mr Sim our Business/Economics expert!) we returned to the hotel for some chill time to rest our legs before dinner out in the evening and some time in Times Square.

Our final full day meant another trip on the subway, this time to get us to Battery Park and the Statue Island Ferry terminal. Here we boarded the ferry for the Statue of Liberty and Ellis Island and got some great snaps of the New York skyline too!



Our final evening was dinner at Ellen's Stardust Diner with some singing performances from both the staff and some of our students! Some new skills were certainly unveiled that evening – although video evidence is being kept under wraps!

On our final morning, we packed up and took a very long walk up to Central Park. 

All three teams are looking forward to going into battle against each other again! Mr Payne




Careers
